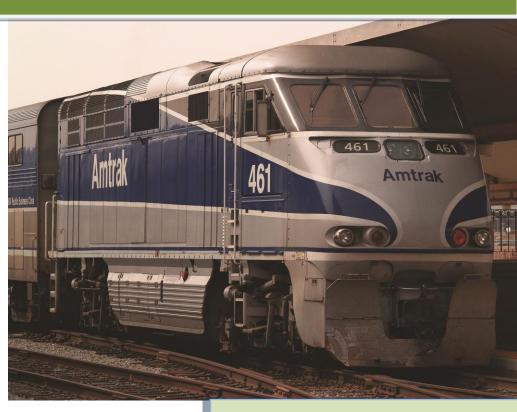

Amtrak Support Levels Illinois 13th District



DFM Research

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Executive Summary:

Nearly 2-in-3 (64%) constituents in the 13th district (hereby referred to as residents) believe that government funding of Amtrak should continue at current levels, when mentioned that eliminating government funding would most likely end Amtrak service in Illinois. Only 2-in-10 support eliminating funding, while 1-in-10 favor increased funding. The level of support for current Amtrak service varies among key demographic groupings, but all groups show strong levels of support:

- By a more than 5-to-1 ratio, residents over age 65 support keeping/increasing Amtrak funding at current levels, versus eliminating funding.
- By a more than 3-to-1 ratio, political Independents support keeping/increasing funding.
- And by a 2-to-1 ratio, self-identified Republican support keeping/increasing funding.

The February 2013 survey of 400 randomly selected (margin of error $\pm 4.9\%$ pts) residents was designed to determine support levels for Amtrak service, while also measuring several themes that might stimulate future passengers utilizing Amtrak service more frequently.

- Residents support the argument (52% agree to 36% disagree) that Amtrak service allows passengers to stay connected by electronic devices, whereas driving restricts the ability to stay connected ... as a reason they might use Amtrak service in the future. The numbers are strongest among those between ages 18-44 (60% to 31%).
- Increasing maximum train speed from 79 to 110 miles per hour (High Speed Rail) was the number one reason why residents would consider using Amtrak in the future; an overwhelming majority of 84 percent found this to be a very likely or fairly likely reason, while only 13 percent said this was not very likely or not at all likely reason. Strong support for High Speed Rail was evident across all demographic groups, including a positive spread of 80-15 percent amongst self-indentified Independents, and a 78-15 percent spread among self-identified Republicans.
- Recent Amtrak passengers found the ride to be favorable, with 81 percent giving a favorable rating for their trip or trips, to only a 5 percent unfavorable rating. The rest were neutral.

In addition to the Amtrak question series, the survey tested the favorability of unions, as well as current topical issues on the federal deficit and Medicare.

- Unions have an overall favorable rating, with an overall 49-36 percent favorable to unfavorable rating; this rating is on par with the NRA, which had an overall 53-31 rating. Self-identified Independents clock in with a 49-35 positive rating for unions. Overall, women and residents age 45 plus show the strongest support levels for unions.
- Over half (52%) of residents support reducing the federal deficit by utilizing mostly spending cuts. Only eight (8) percent support mostly tax increases, with 36 percent favoring a balanced approach of both spending cuts and tax increases. Men are far more likely to support spending cuts than a balanced approach: men 59-29 percent, women 46-42 percent.
- Yet on the other hand, residents do not support the idea of increasing the age of Medicare (as part of entitlement reform) to age 67, from age 65, as a way to cut federal spending. Only 11 percent strongly approve raising the age to 67, while 42 percent strongly disapprove; overall only 36 percent approve of this potential reform proposal, while 60 percent disapprove. Key demographic finding, while varied, show consistent disapproval of raising the age of Medicare to age 67.

- o Those between 45-64 disapprove raising the age by 70-27 percent.
- o Women disapprove raising the age by 66-28 percent.
- o Independent disapprove raising the age by 58-37 percent.
- o Republicans disapprove raising the age by 51-44 percent.

The survey numbers presented in both the executive summary and the full report is a current snapshot of the mind-set of residents of Illinois' 13th congressional district. In general, the numbers show solid support for current Amtrak service in the district; and that faster trains and a more concerted effort to stress the digital connection (compared to motor vehicles) will only increase Amtrak's current usage to Chicago, Saint Louis, and points beyond.

Survey Methodology:

The poll results presented in this report are based on a stratified random sample of 400 adults in Illinois 13th Congressional District. The sample was stratified by four distinct region to ensure a representative sample:

32% - Amtrak Stations (Champaign-Urbana, Bloomington, and Springfield)

21% - Alton Area

31% - Decatur and East Rural

16% - West and Central Rural

After the numbers were stratified into the appropriate region, telephone numbers were then selected at random using a skip pattern to guarantee that the interviews were distributed throughout the region. Each number in the stratified sample had the same non-zero chance of being selected for an interview.

Telephone interviews were conducted by trained staff of Stone Research Services of Indianapolis, Indiana, using a computer assisted telephone interview (CATI) system. To ensure everyone in the household would have an equal chance of being selected, callers would ask to interview the resident over the age-of-18 who had the most recent birthday.

Final results were weighted based on gender, age, self party identification, and the 2012 presidential election results to conform to the 2010 U.S. Census Bureau demographic data and the presidential election results. Below are the final demographic percentage used to weight the survey responses for the general election.

The final results presented are subject to sampling error, which is the difference between results obtained from the survey and those if everyone in the target population were interviewed. The sampling error – margin of error – for this poll is ± 4.9 percentage points with a 95 percent confidence level; meaning that in 19 out of 20 times, the results presented would be within the confidence interval. If final results of a question resulted in a tabulated answer of 50 percent, the confidence interval would between 45.1 to 54.9 percent. It should be noted that the margin of error decreases as results move closer to zero and 100 percent.

Final analysis of the data, as well as project management, was completed by Dean Mitchell of DFM Research in Saint Paul. In addition to his 21 years of political experience, Dean has completed

course work in survey techniques and statistics as part of his Master in Public Policy (MPP) degree from the University of Minnesota's Humphrey School of Public Affairs.

Reading the Survey Results:

The weighted results in this survey reflect an approximate response (within the margin of error) had every adult in Illinois 13th Congressional district participated in the survey. Weighting is a standard technique in survey analysis to best reflect the total population being surveyed without contacting all residents.

The attached report provides topline results, then followed by cross tabulation (crosstabs) results (one question per page). Crosstabs results are for key demographic groups: gender, age, geographic region, political self-identification, and 2012 support for the presidential race.

In questions where you see (VOL) before the answer category, this means the respondent volunteered that answer (it was not read to the respondent). In the crosstab for the 2012 presidential race, only results from respondents who declared that they voted for either Obama or Romney are included. Due to rounding to the nearest full percent, results may not equal 100 percent.

Topline Results:

<u>Interviews</u>: 400 respondents by live caller from Stone Research Services of Indianapolis, Indiana.

<u>Margin of Error</u>: ± 4.9 percentage points with a 95 percent confidence interval.

Interview Dates: February 11-13, 2013.

Sample: Stratified Random Sample. Random digit numbers provided by Survey Sample International

(SSI) of Fairfield, CT. SSI provided Stone Research with 4,000 residential random phone numbers from a pool of listed and unlisted numbers in the boundary area, which then were

stratified into four distinct Illinois 13th Congressional geographical regions.
